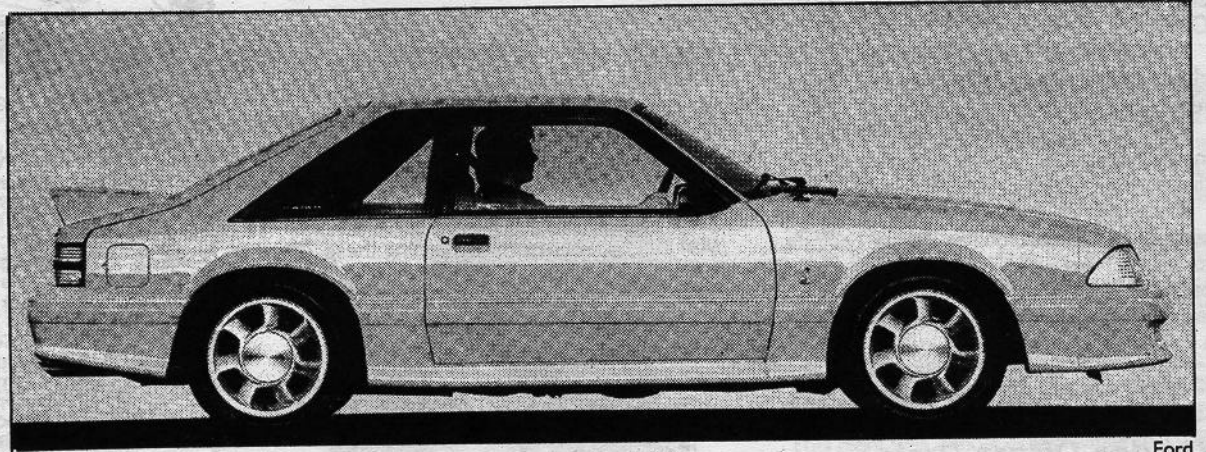


The 1993 Mustang Cobra has more muscle than current Mustangs. It is designed to compete with the Nissan 300, base Corvette and other sports models.

1993 Cobra Displayed At Atlanta Grand National

Visitors to the 1992 MCA Grand National held in Atlanta, GA over Labor Day Weekend got a sneak preview of the 1993 Mustang Cobra — the sporty new Pony car that will go on sale in January.

The bright red prototype featured a more sophisticated exterior and more muscle than

the current Mustangs. Production will be limited to about 5,000 and the Cobra Mustang will sell for about \$2,500 more than the GT model, which lists for about \$15,000.

Ford plans a complete redesign of the Mustang for 1994. The company says the Cobra is intended to compete with the Nis-

san 300 ZX, Chevrolet Camaro and base Corvette, the Mazda RX-7 and 300-series BMWs.

The smoother exterior of the Cobra is readily apparent, but the major changes are fuel intake improvements boosting horsepower of the 5.0 liter V8 engine from 205 to about 245. The engine gives the 3,350-pound Mustang a zero-to-60 mph time of 5.9 seconds. Top speed is 147 mph.

The Cobra, which will roll P245/45ZR17 Goodyear Eagle tires, will also get vented rear disk brakes to shorten stopping distances.

Ford Official Blasts Winston Cup Drivers

Michael Kranefuss, chief of Ford Special Vehicle Operations, commented recently that the decline in the competitiveness of Thunderbirds on Winston Cup tracks results from tentativeness by drivers concerned with the Winston points championship.

Ford drivers Bill Elliott, Davey Allison and Alan Kulwicki occupy the first three spots in the Winston cup standings.

"Davey's been hurt and the others are so concerned about the points they're not willing to put their cars at risk," Kranefuss said.

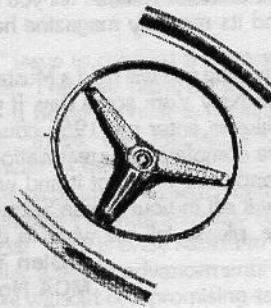
"We'd be a lot better off if the championship paid \$5 instead of \$1 million," added Ford motorsports manager Lee Morse.

"Yeah," replied Kulwicki sarcastically, "We're all just out their stroking for points."
