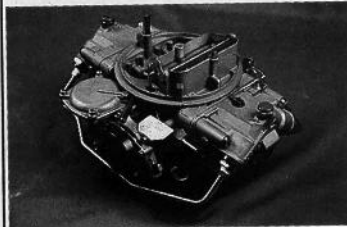

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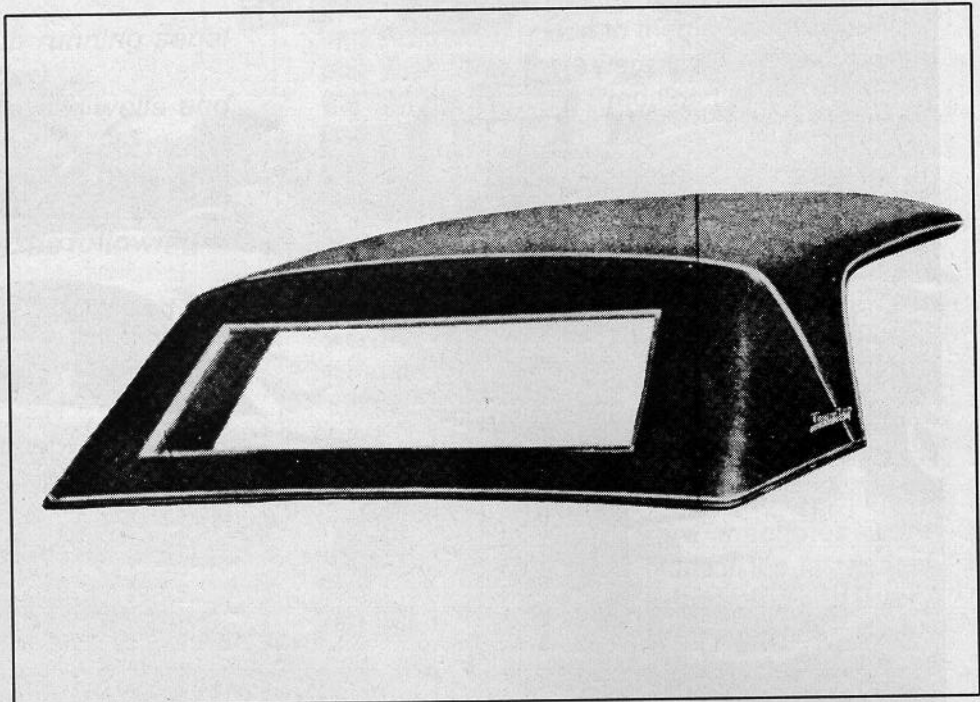
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New, Distinctive "Towne Top"



In January of 1987 the "Mustang Times" ran a picture of my early model convertible with its fiberglass hardtop. No one had any idea where the top was made. Since then, I have found eight other people who have them.

One of those people is Gold Card Judge John Murphy. As far as I can see, he has the rarest one - it's beige colored. All the rest are black.

Recently, a good friend and Ford dealer Gaylord Rowe Jr. of Rowe Brothers Ford in Ellenburg Depot, NY told me he had found something I might like. It was the original sales brochure for the fiberglass "Towne Top".

Dory Development Corporation of New Rochelle, New York was the company who produced this top. The units were actually manufactured in New York, Ohio and Minnesota.

The Dory "Towne Top" came equipped with a dome light, rear

radio speaker, and you could even fasten a luggage or ski rack to the top.

They promoted the top by touting its advantages for the winter although they also claimed it to be cooler in the summer than the convertible top. It was covered with a textured vinyl and came with a rear window of "distortion free" safety glass.

These tops weighed in at 65 pounds and carried a list price of \$289.00. (Do you notice any significance in that particular number? - RJ)

The shipping container of the "Towne Top" even served as its permanent storage box.

It took me about two years to find the one I have. I knew it was in the area, but the car it was on got separated from the top. I eventually found the top in a garage sale for \$35.00.
