Participants in the Founding Club Sponsors Program receive a numbered crystal glass trophy and will also have their name added to the "Wall of Founding

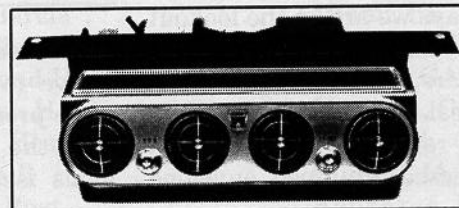
