All told, the track time was enjoyed by all, those who drove and those who watched.

Mustangs lining up for their turn on the Barber track. The paddock area was a happenin' place, with lots of beautiful Mustangs!








Several items were auctioned off at the banquet. Assistant Executive Director Steve Prewitt served as our auctioneer.
