I've been reading Lee Iacocca's recent book, *WHERE HAVE ALL THE LEADERS GONE* (Scribner's 2007). If you can take being shook-up a lot, and if your political armor is not going to fall apart, then you might find this book a rather stimulating adventure in reading.

Mr. Iacocca is more than serious about challenging corporations, politicians, and private citizens to "wake up" and see where the United States of America is headed. It isn't all positive.

Being a Mustang lover, I was intrigued with any references Iacocca made to the Mustang car. At one point, Iacocca is talking about the high points and low points in life. He said, "sometimes you're up and the sky's the limit. Other times you're down and you're sweating bullets." He goes on to illustrate the ups and downs with his story of the introduction the Mustang in 1964 at the New York World's Fair. He said it "was a magic moment in my life. I was on a high then, and the Mustang's success propelled me into the presidency of Ford in 1970. Me, an immigrant kid from Allentown, PA, named president of the second-largest company in the world." Then he describes the other side of the coin. "If being president of Ford was a high, being fired in 1978 from the same job was the pits."

Anyone who has ever been fired understands what the "pits" is like. But, we come thru those times. Lee Iacocca did! And sometimes we leave a positive heritage that we never dreamed we could cause. I don't know if Iacocca realizes it but because of his dream for the Mustang he gave birth to another "Corporation" that you and I know as the MUSTANG CLUB OF AMERICA. It is a corporation that is in business for "doing good."

Did you know that Lee Iacocca has been a leader in founding several organizations for good? He established the Iacocca Institute at his alma mater, Lehigh University. He established the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation for the renovation of this historic landmark, and there is the Iacocca Foundation which he founded to fight Diabetes, which claimed the life of his wife. Although Iacocca didn't found the MUSTANG CLUB OF AMERICA, his driving spirit, and his team at Ford Motor Company inspired the devotees of the Mustang. This growing body of men and women, young and old, became incorporated under the banner that ought to be the banner of all of corporate America, "that the best way to do well is by doing good."

Let me tell you, every MCA member is part of a great "corporation" for doing good. The first two National MCA Shows for 2007 (Mustang, OK, and Louisville, KY) dedicated thousands of dollars each to charities. In fact, I can't think of a National or a Grand National Show that hasn't made donations to special projects for "Good."
