ventory, unnoticed all of these years just waiting for a MUSTANG enthusiast to find them.

My first exposure to Mustang Sun Glasses came after seeing them in "Ray Miller's Mustang Does It". Prior to that, I was not aware that they had been offered as an after-market accessory. Subsequently, thoughts wondering if they could have been manufactured at the Renauld Company and that some years ago were located close by in Leominster, Massachusetts, passed through my mind. I was alos curious to know if a close frined of mine, Jim Bywater, had knowledge of the sun glasses having been manufactured. Jim is currently in the design and engineering of sun glasses with one of the world's largest manufacturers. He also owns a 1965 fuel-injected Corvair which gives him an appreciation for auto accessories.

Some weeks passed, until one evening when we were looking through "Mustang Does It" and turning to page 130, I pointed out the picture of the glasses with the added comment, "Wouldn't id be something to find a pair of these glasses!". Jim replied that he knew of the company that made the glasses and would make some inquiries. He added, the somewhat discouraging remakr, "You realize that it's doubtful that a pair would even exist today."


As the months passed, I periodically inquired to whether or not he had found a pair. His reply was usually negative and afterwards I accepted the fact that they were not to be found. After all, they were expensive even in 1965 at \$22.50 a pair. When you compared that price to other accessories of the times, such as door edge guards for \$2.70, rocker panel mouldings for \$19.10, spotlights at \$29.95, license plate frames for \$4.50, etc., I felt as though not many would have spend the larger sum for a pair of sun glasses. As for putting them away, that was out of the question. Consequently, and like so many things we look for and hope to find but never do, they were simply a thing of the past.





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
